PASTOR MATT'S CORNER

We continue with the series, "Light on the Liturgy", this month we look at the Creed and sharing the peace. Speaking of peace....may you all have a wonderful Christmas season and new year!

APOSTLES' CREED

The profession of faith most frequently called; the Apostles' Creed, has received this title because of its great antiquity. It dates from very early times in the Christian Church; a half century or so from the last writings of the New Testament. The creed originated independently of Scripture in the early oral teaching and preaching of the apostles; but it was not used to supersede Scripture. It was used to corroborate Scripture. One of the important reasons for its creation was to summarize the teachings of the apostles for new converts to the Christian faith. The new converts were expected to commit this short statement of faith to memory as a seal of their baptism; not unlike what is still done today.

We also know that before the middle of the 2nd century, the confession at baptism had crystallized into a shape that we would recognize today as it became to be known as the "Rule of Truth," or "Rule of Faith." It was employed to check the interpretation of Scripture being used throughout the early Church. It was most likely employed as a check on those who sought to allegorize away the Christian faith. It is amazing to realize that forces were attacking the early church just as they do still today. In fact, throughout all of Christian history the debates, discussions, arguments concerning what is really important in our understanding of God as a Triune God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit, still comes back to the centering base which is The Apostle's Creed. Even today, it continues to keep us mindful of the profoundly important aspects of our faith. That is why we confess it together every Sunday.

***SHARING THE PEACE**

Whatever the form, the message is reconciliation. Sharing the peace is integral to the biblical and theological meaning of the service. It teaches the importance of reconciliation in the church. Even in times of conflict, we are able to greet one another in the hope of God's peace which passes all understanding. This is not the time for chitchat or lengthy introductions.

The most common greeting in our culture is a handshake and a word of peace. In the ancient churches of the Middle East where this custom has continued uninterrupted, the form depends on what is common in their culture. For example, Eastern Syrians clasp one another's hand and kiss. Armenians simply bow to one another.

Whatever the form of the greeting, its message is reconciliation between sisters and brothers gathered in God's service.

In Romans 16:16, members of the congregation are encouraged to greet one another "with a holy kiss." The first letter of Peter ends, "Greet one another with a kiss of love. Peace to all of you who are in Christ" (1 Peter 5:14). New Testament references like these point to the origins of the greeting of peace practiced in many congregations at worship. A kiss is a common greeting among friends in the Mediterranean world where Christianity was born. That is one of the shocking aspects of the betrayal of Jesus, accomplished by means of a kiss.

In the second century, Justin Martyr wrote a description of congregational worship primarily for non-Christians. He notes that after the prayers of intercession, those present greet one another with a kiss. Then bread and the cup of wine mixed with water are presented to the presider, who offers praise and thanksgiving to God.*

The place of sharing the peace in the service responds to Jesus' command, "when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come quickly and offer your gift" (Matthew 5:23-24).

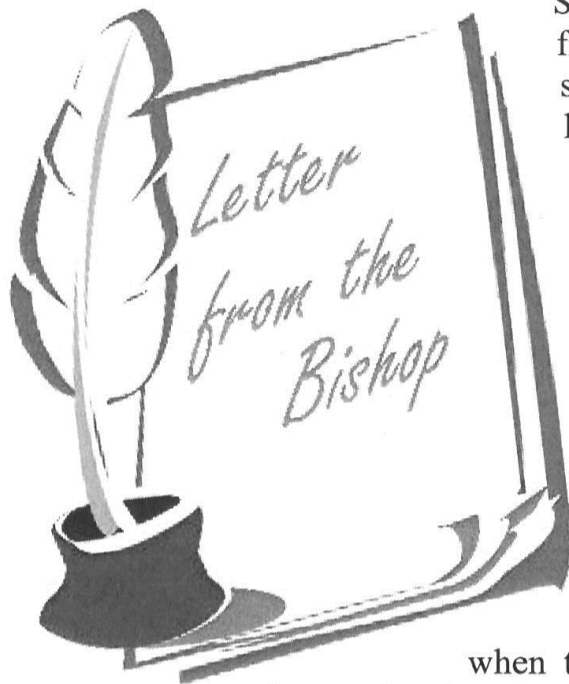

Several months ago, I received a message from Luther Seminary asking if they could send a team out to EWAID to learn about how synods are innovating to meet the changing needs of culture and church and community. Word on the street was that EWAID is a synod doing innovative things, and Luther wanted to send out a team to learn more about us, and the ministries we engage it.

Naturally, I was deeply flattered by the request. It's nice to know that people think EWAID is a synod worth learning about. So while I accepted their request, I wasn't entirely sure what innovative ministries I was going to show the team

when they arrived. It took me a little time to reflect and realize that what many of us see as essential adaptive change, or a good way to benefit from the strengths of our neighbors or colleagues, or even just a wild shot in the dark IS in fact innovation. EWAID is a synod where vital ministry is happening—not just in large, secure congregations but in many of our smaller congregations whose futures are not as certain.

I got to spend about 48 hours with Dr. Katherine Schifferdecker and Katie Langston. We physically visited the following ministry areas:

- St. Paul, Chewelah: Pastor Seth Ramage is serving as a part-time pastor and a part-time hospital chaplain. This is (as far as I know) our synod's first intentionally bi-vocational ministry site. Bi-vocational ministry is going to be more and more a thing our congregations will be faced with, and St. Paul will serve as a valuable resource for how to make it work.
- Fairfield Community Church, Fairfield: Pastor Paul Anderson and members of the congregation shared a meal with us as well as stories of their experience of becoming a federated congregation. Federated congregations are a single congregation that has (in effect) dual citizenship between denominations. In Fairfield's case, it is federated between ELCA Lutherans and Presbyterians. This option is becoming a serious consideration for our congregations in smaller communities where multiple mainline denominations are dwindling in numbers, but still feel God calling them to mission.

FROM THE BISHOP-Continued

- Central, Messiah, St. Peter's, Spokane: Pastor Dave Kappus, Pastor Betty Krafft, and Intern Eric shared the process and on-going conversation around the Tri-Parish partnership their congregations are working to build together. Multi-point parishes have existed for as long as there have been churches, but an *urban* multi-point parish is a fairly new thing. But the idea was born out of a recognition that these congregations could be stronger together, and could have significant impacts on the communities they serve on the South Hill, Shadle, and Hillyard.
- The House Next Door/Learning Peace: A Camp for Kids, Nampa: Deaconess Kat Tigerman and Deacon Diane McGeoch shared with us their passion for connecting church and community through the ministries they lead. The House Next Door provides housing for single mothers while they complete their educational goals. Learning Peace is a free camp program offered to kids in the Nampa area to come and learn about other cultures to promote understanding and peace
- Treasure Valley Cluster: shared with us the impacts of their joint council retreats and their shared confirmation program. By working together, congregations big and small benefit from a wide variety of gifts that are generously shared with one another.

As we traveled, we also chatted about other things happening in the synod. Salem Spokane will be a warming station for the homeless this winter. While the City of Spokane covers some of the demands of this program, it will mean a significant commitment on the part of the congregation to “welcome the stranger”. Advent Lutheran in Spokane Valley is preparing to award grants from their endowment—a gift they share freely with any congregation in the synod (a grant from this fund last year helped the synod pay for our new website—check it out at www.ewaidsynod.org). Central Yakima & Arbol de Vida have entered into a space-sharing agreement and are seeing some very positive cross cultural exchanges happening in a very organic way—strengthening each congregation. We are a teaching synod—there are at least 4 interns learning and serving in congregations in EWAID. These interns will take what they learned here and bring it to the broader church, because we are far more connected than we realize.

Now, I've just put Dr. Schifferdecker and Ms. Langston on a plane back to Minnesota. I'm sitting in the airport, waiting for my own flight home. I am exhausted from 48 hours of intense travel and learning. And, once again, so very humbled by how amazing this synod is! The future isn't certain for any of us, yet we continue to move forward, taking just the next step, trusting that when God needs us to take the next step: it will be revealed. Thank you, for faithfully listening to the voice of the Shepherd who promises to always lead us, to guide our feet in the way of peace.

Notes for Advent Lutheran Church

- **In November, income exceeded expenses by \$4,053.** Envelope giving was lower than average but the church received a \$10,000 Foundation Donation which helped to offset the lower Sunday giving amount.
- Expenses included the budgeted disbursement (10%) of benevolence dollars for the ELCA, Spokane Valley Partners, Maasai Health Systems, Lutheran Community Services and the Wenatchee Valley Lutheran Latino Ministry.
- Average monthly expenses came in \$2,353 lower than average budgeted monthly expenses.
- Average monthly income came in \$1,535 lower than average budgeted monthly income.
- Sunday offering giving for January–November 2018 was \$6,350 lower than in January–November 2017.
- The 2019 budget proposal was approved at the December 2, 2018 Congregational Meeting.

Notes for Advent Lutheran Child Center

- **In November,** expenses exceeded income by \$5,321.
- Total income for the Center increased by \$37,744 when compared to January–November of last year.
- Tuition income dropped in September–November due to the loss of school age children who left at the beginning of the school year as well as open spots in enrollment reserved for students who will advance to the next care level in the near future.
- Total expenses increased by \$34,150 when compared to January–November of last year.
- In past months, payroll expenses have been lower than expected due to the Center being understaffed; however, staff positions were filled in September, which led to an increase in payroll costs.
- The Center has .9 months of average expenses in its reserve.

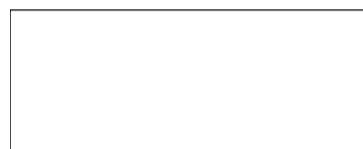
