#### **VITALANT BLOOD DRIVE**

Blood Drive: Advent will host it's next blood drive on January 9, 2022. A sign-up sheet is now available on the table. Questions? Contact Babs Velategui at 701-8041.

Inclement weather and seasonal illnesses can significantly reduce blood drives and donor availability with little notice, but patients need blood every day of the year.

- It's not just snow and cold, but high winds and heavy rain can also cause road closures and blood drive cancellations.
- Donated blood must continually be on hand before each patient need arises.
- Blood donations are being distributed to hospitals as quickly as donations are collected

## All blood types are urgently needed, especially type O

- Type O-negative blood can be transfused to patients of any blood type and is what doctors reach for in trauma situations when there isn't time to determine a patient's blood type.
- Type O-positive can help more than 80% of the population who have Rh-positive blood.

### A few stories:

- Blood donors transform the lives of patients like David, who is alive today with the help of 39 blood donors. In March of 2017, his doctor sent him to the ER where an oncologist confirmed that David had leukemia and would have survived only three or four weeks had he not come to the hospital. David spent 100 days in the hospital enduring rounds of chemotherapy, overcoming medical setbacks, and receiving blood transfusions before he finally heard the words "your cancer is in remission"! "Blood donors gave me a chance to get married, and last fall, become a father," said David. - Jaziel survived leukemia three times thanks to 134 blood donors. He was just seven years old when he was first diagnosed. "My childhood was interrupted by cancer," reflected Jaziel. "Having had cancer for six long, extremely emotional years, I can say I always knew I wasn't alone thanks to my generous blood donors." #### **HEALTHY AGING**

### **Notes for Advent Lutheran Church**

- In November, income exceeded expenses by \$13,260.
- Income was higher this month due to the receipt of an annual \$10,000 foundation grant.
- Average monthly income came in \$2,242 lower than average budgeted monthly income.
- Sunday offerings for January November 2021 came in \$61 higher than January- November 2020.
- Average monthly expenses came in \$2,489 lower than average budgeted monthly expenses.
- Expenses included the budgeted disbursement (10%) of benevolence dollars for the ELCA, Spokane Valley Partners, Maasai Health Systems, and Lutheran Community Services.
- In addition to budgeted operating expenses, the congregation voted to appropriate \$30,000 of reserve funds for the Sullivan Campus roof replacement project. As a result, the current reserve fund balance is \$32,907, which is 1.1 months of budgeted expenses. It is the goal to achieve and maintain one month's of budgeted expenses in reserve (\$30,116).
- 2022 Budget planning has begun.

## Notes for Advent Lutheran Child Center

- In November, expenses exceeded income by \$1,301.
- Total income for January–November 2021 increased by \$78,508 when compared to January- November 2020. The increase in income is mainly due to increased enrollment and Grant income (\$45,100). These Grants have given the Center time to adjust to the changing enrollment and corresponding staffing demands.
- Total expenses for January November 2021 increased by \$29,557 when compared to January -November 2020. This increase is driven by increases in payroll costs due to increases in hourly pay rates and an increase of staff and administrative costs corresponding with increases in enrollment.
- The Center has \$85,412 in reserve, which translates to 1.1 months of budgeted expenses. In order to maintain financial health, it is the goal of the Center to maintain at least one month of budgeted expenses in its reserve (\$77,509).
- 2022 Budget planning has begun.

#### Fund raising for an endoscopy unit

Greetings from Maasai Health Systems. We continue to pursue our goal of buying a new endoscopy unit which is used to look inside the upper and lower intestinal tract. This essential tool for evaluating intestinal tract disease will be a replacement for the currently failing endoscopy unit at Selian Lutheran Hospital. The doctors on staff are already trained in using this tool. We have received \$29,000 towards our goal of US \$35,000 and hope to bring in the full amount by the end of the year with your help.





## **Travels to Tanzania**

Debi and I had planned to travel to Tanzania to work at Selian Lutheran Hospital for several months in 2020 and again in 2021. Of course COVID happened so our trips were canceled. We are now both fully vaccinated, but the COVID situation in Tanzania isn't good so we have no clear date for a return.

## **COVID** and Tanzania

I need to explain the situation in Tanzania. Tanzanian President Magufuli stopped COVID reporting over a year ago. When the vaccines came out, he doubted the benefit of vaccination and instead recommended herbal treatments and steam inhalation. The situation changed in March of 2021 when President Magufuli died of heart failure. Under their constitution, the presidency transferred to the vice president. The new president, Samia Suluhu Hassan, is Tanzania's first female president.

Things are very different now. President Samia appointed a panel to make recommendations on how to address the COVID situation. There are huge problems to overcome, but immunization is now being done within the country. Tanzania received their first one million doses of the J&J vaccine donated by the US with a second million doses that have just been donated by China. They have applied for help from the International Monetary Fund so they can buy additional doses, expand immunization programs in place and fund testing. With their population of 50 million, they have a long way to go.

There certainly have been COVID infections and deaths in Tanzania. However, there has been limited testing which was only started recently so the number of infections and deaths is not known. A resurgence of COVID is starting again in Africa, including the Delta variant, so the next wave of COVID may be worse than those seen in the past.

It will be important to immunize across the globe. Ongoing epidemics in distant lands will still be a risk for renewed outbreaks elsewhere. For example, the COVID Delta variant was first identified in India. In the last big Ebola outbreak in West Africa, we ended up with more Ebola cases in the US than they did in East Africa. Also, with a high rate of viral reproduction, the risk of new variants developing increases. The new variants tend to be more contagious and cause more severe disease. We may need to give totally new vaccines if COVID mutates into a drastically different virus. COVID is a global problem that needs to be dealt with on a global basis.
