When you can't think of anything to write or talk about, it seems we tend to gravitate to writing or talking about the weather. So, it is with me now. I think back what the temperatures were like this time last year, and I am so thankful we are not experiencing the extreme heat this year. The heat wave we endured last year makes me more empathetic to the places where there are heat waves presently going on in the other parts of our nation, including Europe. I've said it before – I'll say it again... "We are blessed to be living in the Pacific Northwest" (be assured I will stop saying it when Mt. Rainier blows its top...).

Oh, I can also write about the 850-mille, 7-day RV trip that Marlene and I went on recently with three other RV travelers/rigs from Spokane. We travelled east to Philipsburg. MT, where we spent two nights at the Boulder Creek Campground. We visited the Berkley Mine Pit (I forget how many cubic feet of water with an acidity of 2.5 - they fire off canons to keep waterfowl away) and walked the streets of upper Butte, where a city-wide folk festival was taking place. There were lots of bands playing, food vendors, and hobby/craft booths to visit. On our way to Salmon, Idaho, we stopped at the Nez Perce National Historic Park and the Big Hole National Battlefield. What a beautiful area, but with a sad and tragic history. One can well understand why the Nez Perce wanted to make that their homeland. We camped two nights near Salmon, Idaho at the Wagonhammer RV Park, located on the North Fork of the Salmon River. From there we made another side trip to Lemhi Pass (National Historic Landmark) on the Continental Divide and visited Sacagawea Historical Area along with the Chief Tendoy Monument. Our last night in our 5th-wheel, with the group, was spent at Chief Timothy State Park, located just west of Clarkston, WA. The RV Park there is located on an island (built by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in the 70's) in the Snake River. A unique experience camping on an island...

SPECIAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING RESULTS

A quorum of **75 members** was confirmed. The motion to approve the acceptance of the offer from the **Comunidad Cristiana de Spokane Church** to purchase the property at **810 S. Sullivan Road, Spokane Valley, WA** for the amount of \$1,550,000 was approved. The motion **passed and was approved** by a written vote of **72 affirmatives and 1 no vote.** The motion to approve the June 5, 2022 minutes was unanimously approved with **73 affirmative votes.**

What treatments are available for COVID-19?

The FDA has approved the antiviral drug Veklury (remdesivir) for adults and certain pediatric patients with COVID-19. This is an intravenous therapy (IV). The FDA has also approved the immune modulator Olumiant (baricitinib) for certain hospitalized adults with COVID-19. During public health emergencies, the FDA may authorize the use of unapproved drugs or unapproved uses of approved drugs under certain conditions. This is called an Emergency Use Authorization (EUA)External Link Disclaimer. Therapeutic products authorized under an EUA are listed on the FDA's EUA page. These products are not a substitute for vaccination against COVID-19.

For example, the FDA has issued EUAs for several monoclonal antibody treatments for COVID-19 for the treatment, and in some cases prevention (prophylaxis), of COVID-19 in adults and pediatric patients. Monoclonal antibodies are laboratory-made molecules that act as substitute antibodies. They can help your immune system recognize and respond more effectively to the virus, making it more difficult for the virus to reproduce and cause harm. There are also two oral antiviral pills, Paxlovid and Lagevrio (molnupiravir), authorized for patients with mildto-moderate COVID-19, with strong scientific evidence they can reduce the risk of progressing to severe disease, including hospitalization and death. If you have a positive COVID-19 test and symptoms, contact your health care provider to see if these treatment options are right for you. The FDA is continually monitoring how authorized and approved treatments for COVID-19 are affected by changing variants. If data shows the authorized dose of a treatment is unlikely to be effective against a current variant, the FDA may announce that the therapy is no longer authorized for use at this time. When that happens, the U.S. government recommends that the product be stored in case that treatment works on a future variant.

The FDA continues to work with developers, researchers, manufacturers, the National Institutes of Health, and other partners to help expedite the development and availability of therapeutic drugs and biological products to prevent or treat COVID-19. To check whether a drug is approved by FDA, search the database of approved drugs by visiting the Drugs@FDA database.

Researchers are studying drugs that are already approved for other health conditions as possible treatments for COVID-19. Additionally, the FDA created the Coronavirus Treatment Acceleration Program (CTAP) to use every available means to assess new treatments and move them to patients as quickly as possible.

Resources to keep yourself and others safe from COVID-19 are available at COVID.gov.

What should I do if I have, or think I have, COVID-19?

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have recommendations for people who are sick with COVID-19 or think they might have COVID-19. In general, most people have mild illness and can recover

By Debbie Martin, RN, Parish Nurse at home. If you think you have been exposed to COVID-19, notify your doctor, monitor your symptoms, and get emergency medical care immediately for emergency warning signs, such as trouble breathing.

> If you think you need a COVID-19 diagnostic test, you can find a community testing site in your state. You can also use an FDA-authorized at-home COVID-19 diagnostic test, which gives you the option of self-testing where it is convenient for you. Be aware that COVID-19 diagnostic tests are authorized for specific uses. For example, some tests can be used by people with and without symptoms and other tests are only for people with symptoms. Also, laboratory-based tests, such as PCR tests, are generally more accurate than at-home tests.

How can I access these treatments?

Depending on your medical history, risks, and symptoms, your health care provider can help you determine whether a therapy that is FDA-approved, or available under an EUA, is right for you. Also, the U.S. government maintains a locator toolExternal Link Disclaimer for COVID-19 thera-

What if my health care provider doesn't know about these treatment options?

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Update: FDA Authorizes Pharmacists to Prescribe Paxlovid with Certain Limitations

New Prescribing Authority Could Improve Access for Some Patients at High Risk for Severe COVID-19

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration revised the <u>Emergency Use Authorization</u> (EUA) for Paxlovid (nirmatrelvir and ritonavir), to authorize state-licensed pharmacists to prescribe Paxlovid to eligible patients, with certain limitations to ensure appropriate patient assessment and prescribing of Paxlovid.

"The FDA recognizes the important role pharmacists have played and continue to play in combatting this pandemic," said Patrizia Cavazzoni, M.D., director for the FDA's Center for Drug Evaluation and Research. "Since Paxlovid must be taken within five days after symptoms begin, authorizing state-licensed pharmacists to prescribe Paxlovid could expand access to timely treatment for some patients who are eligible to receive this drug for the treatment of COVID-19."

When testing positive for COVID-19, patients should first consider seeking care from their regular health care provider or locating a <u>Test-to-Treat site</u> in their area. While this action allows state-licensed pharmacists to prescribe Paxlovid with certain limitations as described below, community pharmacies not already participating as a Test-to-Treat site can decide if or how they will offer this service to patients.

Patients who have tested positive for COVID-19 and are seeking to determine their eligibility for receiving Paxlovid at locations where prescribing by state-licensed pharmacists is available should bring the following information to ensure that the state-licensed pharmacist has sufficient information to determine their eligibility to receive Paxlovid: Electronic or printed health records less than 12 months old, including the most recent reports of laboratory blood work for the state-licensed pharmacist to review for kidney or liver problems. State-licensed pharmacists could also receive this information through a consult with the patient's health care provider.

A list of all medications they are taking, including over-thecounter medications so the state-licensed pharmacist can screen for drugs with potentially serious interactions with Paxlovid.

Under the limitations outlined in the authorization, the state-licensed pharmacist should refer patients for clinical evaluation with a physician, advanced practice registered nurse, or physician assistant licensed or authorized under state law to prescribe drugs, if any of the following apply: Sufficient information is not available to assess renal and hepatic function.

Sufficient information is not available to assess for a potential drug interaction. Modification of other medications is needed due to a potential drug interaction.

Paxlovid is not an appropriate therapeutic option based on the current <u>Fact Sheet for Healthcare Providers</u> or due to potential drug interactions for which recommended monitoring would not be feasible.

Paxlovid is authorized for the treatment of mild-to-moderate COVID-19 in adults and pediatric patients (12 years of age and older weighing at least 40 kilograms or about 88 pounds) with positive results of direct SARS-CoV-2 viral testing, who are at high risk for progression to severe COVID-19, including hospitalization or death. Patients in the authorized population who report a positive home test result from a rapid antigen diagnostic test, or a positive PCR test, to their provider are eligible for Paxlovid under the EUA. Confirmation of a positive home rapid antigen diagnostic test with additional direct SARS-CoV-2 viral testing, such as a PCR, is not required. Antibody tests are not considered to be direct SARS-CoV-2 viral tests.

Notes for Advent Lutheran Church

- Expenses include the budgeted disbursement (10%) of benevolence dollars for the ELCA, Spokane Valley Partners, Maasai Health Systems, and Lutheran Community Services.
- Income from Jan-June was \$172,169 which is \$5,060 above budget and \$1,491 above last year.
 - o Income includes \$6,400 from the Malzacher grant.
- For the year income is lower than expenses by \$1,144.
- Total operating expenses from Jan-June was \$173,313 which is \$2,727 over budget and \$24,388 below last year.
 - A large portion of the increase in expenses over budget is in administrative expenses which are \$1,607 over budget and property expenses which are \$3,483 over budget.
 - Broadway campus expenses have gone up over the past year primarily because of an increase in utilities and janitorial services.
 - o The Sullivan campus expenses have gone up over budget primarily in maintenance.
 - o The decrease in the operating expense over last year includes the increase in wages that were budgeted for and were lowered from the previous year due to the roof replacement at the Sullivan campus in 2021.
- Reserves are \$41,695 which is 1.66 approximately months of operating expenses.

- Income exceeded expenses by \$,231.81 for June.
- We received our yearly Early Achievers Grant in the amount of \$5,000. This money goes towards staffing.
- Bonuses went out in June to staff using grant money awarded to us in December for the purpose of staff retention.
- Total Reserve Amount is \$160,383.50. Budgeted monthly expenses are \$80,185. This equates to 2 months of reserve.
